Writing Your News Stories

The How-to

- 1. The producer will start by asking for input and assigning stories to the reporters. Each reporter will work independently and write up the story. (Reporters may need to ask a group member to play a role in their story). Use online resources, or books in class to brainstorm for ideas.
- 2. The producer needs to make a list of reporters and their story assignments and submit to the NMC News Tonight CEO for approval.
- 3. Each reporter will begin to research and write their stories. They may ask anchors to help and use other group members as part of their stories.
- 4. Producers need to set the due dates and keep their team on schedule.
- 5. Anchors will work with the producer to write up the script they'll use to introduce each story and banter between segments. The script should be entertaining and give viewers a teaser of what's to come in each story.
- 6. Once the script and all the stories have been written, you can practice. Costumes should be used when possible.

How to write a news story

- 1. Make notes about the 5W's. These need to be included in the lead (opening) of your story.
- 2. Give background information for context. What events led to this story? Who else is involved? Why does this story matter to viewers?
- 3. Interview or get quotes from people directly impacted by the story.
- 4. Be sure to provide all sides to the story. Find someone to give a different perspective.
- 5. End with a non-essential, but interesting detail, to tie up the story.
- 6. Finish your report with "Colleen Nelson, NMC News Tonight, Tokyo, Japan" to tell the audience your name, network and location.
- 7. Provide one or two questions (and answers) for the anchor to ask you. The producer will have final say on if they are used.
